## 2016–17 SEASON PREVIEW

To make it three consecutive and the program's 19th national championships appearance, the Olivet Nazarene University men's basketball team will have to answer several question marks as they enter the 2016-17 season. If they answer them, the season could continue the first such streak since the 2006 to 2008 seasons.

The absence of seven seniors and two-time NAIA All-American **Aaron Larson** mark big changes for the team. Over the past four years, Larson and his teammates had 77 wins plus two national tournament appearances and the 2015 CCAC regular season and tournament titles.

Yet, the expectations still remain high, despite the unfamiliar territory the 2016-17 team is in with many new faces and the amount of inexperience on the floor. ONU returns only six players who were in uniform last season and suited up for the 2016 NAIA Division II National Championships. The 2016-17 team will be without nearly 90 percent of last year's scoring and 85 percent of its rebounding. Absent this season is almost three-fourths of the minutes played and shots attempted from last season.

The 2016-17 version of ONU men's basketball has the task of bringing along a host of talented and eager young players and joining them together with veterans who are ready to take the next step in their careers. Head Coach **Ralph Hodge**, a near 750-game winner, and his staff have the job of molding this team in order to realize its potential.

Coach Hodge understands what it take to get this year's team ready, "The key thing for this year is to have a team that will commit to the process on a daily basis. We are young and inexperienced at all positions, so the daily development and how quick all our players learn and grow together will be important."

Over the last two seasons, the Tigers have seen 13 integral team members exhaust their eligibility and leave the program. The 2015-16 senior class sent out seven Tigers who had much to celebrate as they all did their part, starting with Aaron Larson. He was named to the NAIA Second Team All-America list, following his third team selection during his junior season. He was a three-time CCAC First Team All-Conference selection and was named the 2013 CCAC Freshman of the Year. He was also recognized on the 2014 NAIA Honorable Mention All-America list. He was named CCAC Player of the Week 13 times in his career and NAIA Division II National Player of the Week twice last season.

Last season, Larson led the Tigers in 10 statistical categories, including minutes, points and rebounds. He led the CCAC in scoring (22.6) and was 12th in the NAIA. Among ONU leaders, he finished his career with 2,132 career points (3rd), 971 rebounds (4th) (Note: before he was one of only two players all-time to record 2,000 points and 900 rebounds.). He had 813 made field goals (3rd) and 1,518 field goals attempted (3rd), 365 made free-throws (6th) and 495 attempted (9th). Larson is tied 16th all-time in Tiger history with 141 made three-pointers in his career. He is the only player in program history to be in the top 20 for both rebounds and three-pointers.

Alongside Larson was two-time CCAC Honorable Mention All-Conference selection **Zach Wagner**. He started 91 games in his career and finished his career with 1,127 points, good for 34th all-time in ONU history. Last season, he started all 29 games and was third in minutes played (27.1), third on the team in scoring (11.1), third in rebounding (4.7), second in field goal percentage (.507) and second in assists (79). He also was a three-time CCAC All-Academic Team member. ONU will also miss **Reid Farchmin**, who started 77 games, averaged 7.2 points and 4.3 rebounds, and shot 71.5 percent from the free-throw line over four years. Last season, he scored 6.7 points and grabbed 4.2 boards a game.

**Alex Thorson**, point guard, also moved on and is now the graduate assistant for the Tiger men's basketball program. He started all 29 games last year and had 157 assists to only 44 turnovers, leading the CCAC in both assists per game and assist-to-turnover ratio. He finished his career with 328 assists, good for 19th all-time. **Taylor Tucker**, also a point guard, finished his career last year as well. He played in 23 games last year and 45 in his career. He will help as a student assistant this season. **Leke Solanke** finished his second year with the Tigers, starting 15 games and scoring 7.7 points and grabbing 4.9 rebounds a game. **Luke Steelman** finished his fourth season playing in 23 games.

Despite all from the changes from the 2015-16 squad, a familiar face returns to help lead this year's Tigers. **Tyler Crater (Hampshire, III.)** is in his fourth season as a Tiger. As the lone senior with significant experience, he will be counted on to raise the level of his game in order for the Tigers to do the same. Throughout his first three years, Crater has played in 91 games, averaging 20.9 minutes and 9.6 points per game. He has 871 points in his career and is heading for 1,000 — which would make him

the 42nd player in the program's history to reach that career milestone. Crater is also currently tied for 19th in career three-pointers made (123) and can make the top 10 with 55 made this season.

As ONU's second-leading scorer (11.3) from a year ago, Crater played in all 29 games and was one of the most consistent contributors off the bench in the CCAC for Olivet, playing 22.4 starter minutes. He was second on the team in field goals (286), making 121, and was third in made three-pointers (44-for-122). He also averaged 2.9 rebounds and 2.0 assists, which are his areas for improvement. He is coming off the 2016 national tournament game, where he led the Tigers in scoring with 18 points (7-for-16), going 3-for-6 from behind the arc. He added three rebounds and assists in 29 minutes. His best attributes are his athleticism and aggressiveness, which he has learned to partner with solid decision-making and leadership abilities to help his team.

Returning for his junior season is **Chris Green (Bonfield, III.)**, one of only two returning Tigers who tallied significant time last season. In only his second year, Green played in all 29 games and started in 13. He played 20.6 minutes per game and was fifth on the team in scoring with 7.3 points a game. He also contributed 2.3 rebounds and 1.9 assists, led the team in three-pointers made with 54, and shot 39.4 percent from behind the arc (13th among CCAC leaders). In ONU's fifth game last season, he scored a career-high 23 points, making six three-pointers. Green is coming off a summer of working on attacking the rim, passing, ballhandling, and increasing his overall athleticism, which will help defensively and around the basket. Yet, his ability to stretch the floor and shoot the deep ball will help the Tigers this season.

Possibly the greatest need for this year's team is for the inside game. The only returning Tiger post player from last year is 6-foot, 6-inch senior **Ryan Carl (Galesburg, III.)**. He played behind four seniors who are now gone and played in only eight games during his first full season in a varsity uniform. Yet, he has three years of junior varsity experience and is excited for a much awaited opportunity to lead and step up an unestablished post game in 2016-17. Carl brings a knowledge of Hodge's system, is a solid perimeter shooter and has so far been a vocal leader for this young group in the post.

Always one of the most scrutinized positions in Hodge's program is point guard. Returning from the 2015-16 team is **Troy Swindle (Lindenhurst, III.)** to fill that position. Now a senior, he played in 14 games last season, primarily as an off guard. He has good size and athleticism for the position and has the ability to push the ball and finish at the rim. Swindle can also use his length to defend all 94 feet.

New this season is **Dane Schlafley (Peoria, III.)**, a 6-foot, 1-inch freshman point guard who played four years at Richwoods High School. He has impressed in only a short time this summer and throughout the preseason, showcasing his decision-making abilities and toughness on both ends of the floor, especially defensively. He sees the entire floor in transition and in the half court, also showing the ability to shoot and score from all areas. While at Richwoods, as a senior he averaged 9.4 points, 3.0 rebounds, 3.0 assists and 1.0 steal per game; and shot 81 percent from the free-throw line, 49.0 from behind the arc and 42.0 from the field.

Bolstering the perimeter game alongside Crater and Green are two promising freshmen: 6-foot, 3-inch **Dakota Bennington (Peoria, III.)** and 6-foot **Sterling Thornton (Sterling, III.)**. Bennington played at Peoria Christian High School, where he averaged a team-high 24.4 points, 7.4 rebounds, 3.1 assists, 2.9 steals and 2.1 steals a game for his senior season. He became Peoria Christian High School's all-time leading scorer with 1,958 career points. He was named IBCA 2A First Team All-State, AP 2A First Team All-State and Chicago Sun-Times 2A First Team All-State. Bennington was the Peoria Journal Star Small School Player of the Year. Entering his senior season, he was the 30th ranked prospect (9th for shooting guard), according to Prep Hoops Illinois. He was 56th ranked in the City/Suburban Hoops Report (12th for shooting guard). He is an outstanding athlete with tremendous bounce (35" vertical, 78" wingspan) and great body control. Bennington also has a very quick first step and can finish very well for a first year player.

Thornton was one of the most productive players in Sterling High School's history, leaving as the sixth all-time leading scorer with 1,113 points. He led his team as a senior with averages of 14.0 points, 4.0 rebounds, 2.1 assists and 2.4 steals. He shot 45.2 from the field, 38.0 from the three-point line and 71.9 percent from the free-throw line. Following his senior season, he was honored as a 2016 Northern Illinois Big 12 All-Conference First Team selection and Sauk Valley Media First Team honoree. Thornton is as competitive and smart as they come, using his experience and success as a quarterback in high school to his advantage.

## 2016-17 SEASON PREVIEW

From day one of this season, both Bennington and Thornton will be asked to add depth and the talent needed at the perimeter position because of the skillset each of them brings. It is evident, however, that both bring great basketball instinct and the willingness to learn each day. This will help them as they navigate through their first year as Tigers.

Returning on the perimeter are 6-foot, 4-inch sophomore **Christian Dunning (West Frankfort, III.)** and senior **Abe Barwegen (Otsego, Mich.)**. Dunning was in uniform last season and played significantly on the junior varsity. After his freshman year, he has come back focused and ready to accept a more demanding role in his second year. He has good size for the guard position and has the ability to score at the rim and post up, similar to former Tiger Reid Farchmin. He continues to get better defensively and on the glass. Barwegen has played the last three years on the junior varsity and dressed as a junior on the varsity team. He can help this year with his skill of shooting from behind the arc, and he brings a great competitiveness.

"We are excited about the makeup of our team," said Coach Hodge about the 2016-17 roster. "They are young, yes, but our perimeter positions have the potential to be as good as any in the conference. Our post play, as it develops, will surprise some people. Never before have we had a year where new players, specifically the freshman class, will have an impact on the type of season we have."

Even though the Tiger post game will look completely different than it did last year, there is ample opportunity for this year's grouping to step up and take advantage of what's available. The 2016-17 post game is also different because of the skill sets Bennington, Thornton, Dunning and Barwegen bring, as all four can shoot the three-pointer and stretch the floor.

Coming off injury and sitting out the entire 2015-16 season is 6-foot, 7-inch **Josiah Blan** (**Minooka, III.**). He injured his shoulder in the summer of 2015 and redshirted after surgery sidelined him for several months. He returns for a second season, ready to make an impact and bringing a contagious tenacity and readiness to play hard on every play. He is ONU's most athletic big and can play around the rim. Blan runs very well and has a knack for scoring in bunches. He can shoot it from perimeter and from inside with both hands.

Joining him is 6-foot, 3-inch **Zach Tuxhorn (Naperville, III.)**. Tuxhorn may be undersized for the position, but he has learned to play around the basket with toughness. In his first year of playing junior varsity for the Tigers, he developed into a consistent rebounder and someone who didn't back down for any matchup. Tuxhorn also has the ability to knock down a perimeter shot and is continuing to work on his game around the rim.

A new addition to ONU's post play is 6-foot, 5-inch **Nic Reed (New Albany, Ind.)**. He played for the Christian Academy of Indiana and left as the all-time leading scorer with 1,254 points. He averaged team-highs as a senior with 23.6 points, 11.1 rebounds and 2.1 assists. He shot 80 percent from the free-throw line, 61 percent from the field and 37 percent from the three-point line. Following his senior season, he was honored as a 2016 IBCA Senior Small School All-State First Team and IBCA All-State All-Academic First Team. Reed was also a News and Tribune All-Area First Team selection and Player of the Year finalist. He was selected to the Hoosier Basketball Magazine Top 60 Workout and Battle of the Bridges All-Star Game. He is still learning to play with his back to the basket but is as aggressive as any post player in purple and gold. He has a soft touch and can shoot the ball with range. Reed is as talented as any freshman in the position, playing with good hands and the ability to finish despite giving up size around the rim. He rebounds hard and is learning how to use his body to post and get position. He should factor into the rotation in his first season.

Together with fellow freshmen Nic Reed, **Luke Tuttle (Hampshire, III.)** is one of five freshmen in uniform this season. He led the Whippurs last season by averaging 12.0 points and 4.0 rebounds, shooting 45 percent from the floor and 37 from behind the arc, making 50. Following his senior campaign, he was selected to the Fox Valley All-Conference Team, Daily Herald-Fox Valley All-Area Team and was McHenry County All-Star. Everything is new to Tuttle as he is learning a different position, but has picked things up very quickly. Tuttle is a very smart player who can shoot the perimeter shot. He is a good athlete and is working on his strength each day to help him battle the physicality the position demands.

While the Tigers' primary goal is to return to the NAIA Division II National Championships for the third consecutive season and 19th time in program history, the Tigers would also like to regain CCAC regular season title and/or tournament championship they had back in 2015. Last year's 18-11 record and second place finish in the CCAC was good enough to gain them an at-large bid to the NAIA Division II National Championships, but the first round loss to Keiser University (Fla.) was the sixth straight appearance in which Olivet had not advanced past the first round. The Tigers have expectations to get back and win their first national tournament game since 2006, and they will have to do it with individuals who have never been there.

As for the 2016-17 season's goals, Coach Hodge comments: "Our goals this season are the same as every year. Win the conference and make it to the postseason tournament. We may see a slow start, but we feel this team is capable of finishing strong and accomplishing our goals."

Head Coach Ralph Hodge is one of the best in NAIA basketball and a 2014 NAIA Hall of Fame inductee. He is ranked second among active NAIA Division II coaches with 748 career wins and 10th in win percentage (.623). Among all NAIA coaches, he is third all-time in wins and 22nd in win percentage (coaches on active top 25 list).

The Tigers will play their annual Homecoming game on Saturday, Oct. 29, for the first game of this season. Olivet will host Crossroads League opponent, Goshen College (Ind.). The Maple Leafs finished 19-13 and fourth in their league.

For the fifth consecutive season, the ever-tough CCAC will experience change. Governors State University (III.) joins the league and will play in the South Division. In addition, former athletic programs Purdue University-Calumet (Ind.) and Purdue University-North Central (Ind.) have combined to create Purdue University-Northwest (Ind.). Despite these changes, the league still boasts 15 teams, giving the CCAC three automatic bids to the national tournament. The Tigers will play nine nonconference contests and 21 conference games before the conference tournament.

In 2016, the CCAC produced four teams that played in the NAIA Division II National Championships and finished the season with four teams ranked or receiving votes nationally. ONU hosts two of those teams at McHie Arena this season. The CCAC Tournament winner, Robert Morris-Illinois, comes to Bourbonnais on Dec. 13. The defending league-champion, University of St. Francis (III.), will be in town on Jan. 11, 2017, just after the new year.

As in the 2015-16 season, the Tigers play away from McHie Arena in 14 of the first 18 games. One of those is on the road on Dec. 14 against NCAA Division I Mid-American Conference opponent, Northern Illinois University. The Huskies were 21-13 last season. On Dec. 10, the Tigers travel to play against NCAA Division II opponent, University of Indianapolis (Ind.), for the second straight season. The Greyhounds finished 21-8 last season, finished as runner-up in the GLVC Tournament and won their first round game in the NCAA DII Midwest Regional.

ONU's first weekend tournament will be played at Indiana Wesleyan University, the defending NAIA DII National Champion, for the Caleb Dimmich Memorial Classic. ONU will play Indiana Wesleyan on Friday, Nov. 4, and Marian University (Ind.) on Saturday, Nov. 5. A week later, the Tigers travel to Fort Wayne, Ind., and play Indiana Tech, the team that finished 23-10 and appeared in the NAIA DII national championships last season.

The week leading up to Christmas, the Tigers travel to Phoenix, Ariz., for three games in the Chandler-Gilbert Classic. The first is against NAIA DI Arizona Christian on Saturday, Dec. 17. The Firestorm finished 23-9 last season, made it to the second round of the national tournament and ranked as high as No. 4 nationally last season. ONU's second game is Monday, Dec. 19, against the University of Great Falls (Mont.). On Tuesday, the Tigers meet William Jessup University (Calif.), the team that finished 19-11 and in the second round of the national tournament after defeating No. 5 Pikeville.



#### 2000 - Tulsa, Okla. (Tulsa Convention Center)

The Tigers won both the CCAC's regular-season and tournament titles, which propelled them to their fourth straight national tournament appearance.

Against 13th-seeded Columbia College (Mo.) in the first round, senior Lee Coomler led four Tigers in double figures with 15 points. Fellow senior Drew Neal finished with 14 points and 10 rebounds in a 62-59 win.

In round two, the Tigers ran away from unseeded Lewis-Clark State University (Idaho), thanks to 21 points from Coomler and another double-double (15 points, 10 rebounds) from Neal.

That victory moved the Tigers into the national quarterfinals for the first time, where they faced 12th-seeded Spring Hill College (Ala.). The Tigers wore down Spring Hill in the second half, and a win for the defense led to a 62-44 victory that pushed the Tigers into the Final Four. And for the third straight game, the combination of Coomler, Zach Freeman, Brian McCauley and Neal again scored in double figures.

In their third game, the Tigers ran into the top-ranked team in the country, Life University (Ga.), in the national semifinals. The Tigers outscored Life in the second half, but an 18-point halftime deficit was too much to overcome in an 85-69 loss. Freeman led the team with 26 points and eight rebounds. The loss ended the careers of Coomler, McCauley, Neal, Tyler Field and Jason Mulligan, all of whom had been instrumental in leading the Tigers to their first-ever Final Four appearance. Coomler, McCauley and Neal all passed the 1,000-point plateau, with Coomler ranking third all-time with 1,913 points. Neal's 938 rebounds ranked him third, and Field's 515 ranked him fourth. Meanwhile, McCauley and Coomler are still Nos. 1 and 3, respectively, in three-pointers.

Coomler earned NAIA All-American Second Team honors, while Neal was named a NAIA All-American Honorable Mention. Freeman was chosen to the NAIA All-Tournament Team. The Tigers finished 30-9, one of two times Olivet has reached the 30-win plateau.

#### 2002 - Kansas City, Mo. (Municipal Auditorium)

A loss to Barat College (III.) in the CCAC Tournament championship left the Tigers needing an at-large bid to qualify for the national tournament, where they faced 13th-seeded Edward Waters College (Fla.) in the first round. Led by senior Zach Freeman's 23 points and sophomore Jeremy Riddle's 20, the Tigers overcame first-half turnovers to win 80-64, their fourth straight first-round win.

In the second round, the Tigers withstood a furious second-half rally from longtime NAIA District 20 rival McKendree College (III.) to pick up an 85-78 win. Freeman led the way with 35 points and 14 rebounds, while Riddle and junior Tony Hodge chipped in 18 and 13 points, respectively.

In the Elite Eight for the second time in three years, the Tigers' early lead against Oklahoma Baptist University didn't last in an 89-69 loss. In the final game of his career, Freeman recorded yet another double-double with 22 points and 10 rebounds. Freeman is still the school's all-time leading scorer and rebounder with 2,768 points and 1,234 rebounds. He also became the Tigers' third two-time NAIA All-American, and was named to the NAIA All-Tournament Team for a second time. The Tigers finished 27-9.

#### 2003 - Kansas City, Mo. (Municipal Auditorium)

Senior Tony Hodge hit a jumper at the buzzer to send the Tigers to the CCAC Tournament title game — Coach Ralph Hodge's 500th victory — but there they fell to St. Xavier University (III.) and needed an at-large bid to qualify for the national tournament.

In the opening round, the Tigers finished with a flurry to knock off the 2001 national champion, Faulkner University (Ala.), 63-58. Junior Jeremy Riddle scored a game-high 17 points, while junior Marcus Lyte finished with 10 points, all in the second half.

Riddle again led all scorers with 26 points in an 83-78 secondround win over John Brown University (Ark.), one that required another strong finish by the Tigers. Lyte, Hodge and senior Andy McCormick all finished in double figures. In the quarterfinals, the Tigers faced a familiar opponent in McKendree College (III.), which had beaten Olivet by 16 earlier in the season. This time, the game was closer, but McKendree escaped with a 64-62 win. Hodge led the Tigers with 25 points.

Tony Hodge and Scott Hodge are in the top 20 in school history for three-pointers and assists, respectively. The Tigers finished 23-14, their 15th straight 20-win season.

#### 2006 - Kansas City, Mo. (Municipal Auditorium)

The Tigers qualified for the 2006 national tournament via an at-

large bid and entered ranked No. 17 in the NAIA Top 25 poll, their highest-ever ranking entering the tournament. It was also their 12th appearance, the most by an Illinois school. In the first round, sophomore Phil French came off the bench to tally 16 points and eight rebounds — both team highs — to lead the Tigers past 16th-seeded Wayland Baptist University (Texas). Junior Stan Chismark and seniors Zach Birkey and Zach Johnson reached double figures and helped the Tigers overcome 18 turnovers.

Then in the second round, the Tigers turned in perhaps their best performance of the season. The Tigers held top-ranked Mountain State University (W.Va.) to its lowest point total of the season in a 79-65 win to advance to the national quarterfinals. Chismark poured in 27 points, French scored 16 points, and Birkey chipped in 11 points and 10 assists.

The good fortune ended there, however. Against Oklahoma Baptist University, the same team that ended Olivet's run in 2002, the Tigers trailed by double digits early and didn't recover. French led the way with 16 points and six rebounds. Chismark earned NAIA All-America Third Team honors and was named to the NAIA All-Tournament Team. The Tigers finished 23-11.

### 2007 – Kansas City, Mo. (Municipal Auditorium)

After receiving a fourth straight at-large bid to the national tournament, the Tigers squared off in the first round against No. 7 Park University (Mo.), a team with two transfers from NCAA Division I Central Michigan University. The Tigers led by as many as 14 points but couldn't hold on in a 68-62 loss.

Junior Phil French scored 18 points to lead the Tigers, who fell in the first round for the first time since 1997. Ryan Paxson added 17 points, while Tyler Wallenfang and Josh Bronke chipped in 15 and 12, respectively.

NAIA All-American Stan Chismark, the team's second-leading scorer, missed the game with a knee injury. He finished his career as only the third player in school history to rank in the top 20 in scoring (1,433), rebounding (596) and assists (337). He was named a NAIA All-American Honorable Mention, and French was named to the NAIA All-America Second Team. The Tigers finished 19-10.

#### 2008 - Kansas City, Mo. (Municipal Auditorium)

The Tigers' strength of schedule helped them earn a fifth-straight at-large bid, and they squared off in the first round against fifth-seeded Mountain State University (W.V.), which finished the regular season with a 30-2 record.

The Tigers' second-half comeback forced overtime. NAIA All-American Phil French fouled out, but Tyler Wallenfang made one of two free throws with 34 seconds left to send the game to another overtime. Mountain State rattled off 13 unanswered points in the second OT, and the Tigers fell 86-75. French finished his Tigers' career 10th all time in points (1,547), eighth in rebounds (765) and eighth in free throws made. The Tigers finished 17-15.

#### 2010 - Kansas City, Mo. (Municipal Auditorium)

After a one-year absence, the Tigers returned to the national tournament to face 12th-seed Lee University (Tenn.) in the first round.

The Tigers struggled against Lee, which entered the tournament winning 13 of its last 14 games. Freshman Jordan Harks scored 10 and grabbed nine rebounds, but the effort wasn't enough in the 21-point loss.

The first-round loss ended the Tigers' career of NAIA All-American Tyler Wallenfang, who finished 15th in points (1,438) and 14th in rebounds (632). Josh Broken ended his career 10th in three-pointers (157) and 16th in assists (332). The Tigers finished 19-11.

#### 2011 - Kansas City, Mo. (Municipal Auditorium)

The Tigers returned to the national tournament for the fifth time in six years and faced Georgetown College (Ky.), ranked No. 7 in the NAIA Top 25 poll.

Thanks to sharp three-point shooting and solid bench play, the Tigers kept the game close. But Georgetown, winner of both its conference's regular-season and tournament titles, pulled away late to hand Olivet an 83-76 loss.

Junior Antonio Marshall led the Tigers with 18 points, while seniors Nick Klomstad and Cory Hainlen added 14 and 11, respectively.

Hainlen ended his Tigers' career with 143 three-pointers, 13th on the school's all-time list. Matt Mitchell finished his with 106 three-pointers, the 18th best mark in school history.

## 2015 –Point Lookout, Mo. (Keeter Gymnasium – College of the Ozarks)

For the first time in program history, the Olivet Nazarene University men's basketball team earned a trip to the NAIA Division II National Championships. It was the 17th overall appearance and first since

2011 for the Tigers in national tournament play.

The Tigers (25-9, 16-3) won CCAC Regular Season and Tournament titles, earning an automatic bid to the postseason tournament. ONU had not won the regular season (12th overall) since 2006 and tournament (6th overall) since 2000.

In the first round, the Tigers played Warner Pacific College (Ore.), ranked No. 16 in the NAIA Top 25 poll. Warner Pacific entered the tournament with a 25-7 record and had finished in a three-way tie for first in the Cascade Collegiate Conference — arguably the toughest league in NAIA Division II — sending four teams to the national tournament.

Olivet drew the late game on Wednesday, March 11, but was ready to gain a first round win nonetheless. The Tigers led early through a sloppy group of opening minutes, but costly turnovers and streaking shooting by the Knights gave them the lead. Olivet was able to keep it close until five minutes to go in the first half when Warner Pacific took a double-digit lead for the remainder of the game. Olivet was unable to get back any momentum and fell 79-54.

The Tigers were led by junior forward Aaron Larson's 13 points and eight rebounds. Senior Austin Davis chipped in 12 points, including three from long distance. Junior Zach Wagner added six points and three rebounds. Senior Hunter Jacobs had two points and two rebounds. Matt Ryan had three rebounds.

The first-round loss ended the career of five Olivet seniors: Austin Davis, Matt Ryan, Hunter Jacobs, Seth Johnson and Riley Johnson. Davis was named All-CCAC Second Team, and Matt Ryan was a Daktronics-NAIA Scholar-Athlete. Davis became the 40th player in school history to reach 1,000 points, finishing with 1,239 (29th all-time). He also ended his career with 250 three-pointers, second on the school's all-time list. He also made 102 three-pointers his senior year, breaking ONU's single season record.

## 2016 – Point Lookout, Mo. (Keeter Gymnasium – College of the Ozarks)

Not since 2010 and 2011 had the the Olivet Nazarene University men's basketball team made back-to-back national postseason appearances. In 2016, the Tigers made a return trip to the NAIA Division II National Championships, their 18th overall appearance.

The Tigers (18-11, 17-4) finished second in the CCAC regular season standings, forcing them to earn an automatic bid by

winning the postseason tournament. However, Olivet slipped up in the quarterfinals, falling to IU-South Bend 90-75. Yet, the season wasn't over for the Tigers as an at-large bid awaited them due to their No. 21 national ranking.

In the first round, the Tigers played a familiar foe, No. 9 Keiser University (Fla.), which the Tigers had played previously during the season on December 30 in West Palm Beach, Fla. The Seahawks defeated the Tigers 72-66 on their home court. Keiser entered the tournament with a 28-4 record and had finished as runner-up in the Sun Conference Tournament championship game after winning the regular season title. The Seahawks were coached by Rollie Massimino, long-time head coach and National Collegiate Basketball Hall of Famer.

Olivet drew the first game of the tournament on Wednesday, March 9, but nonetheless was to gain a first round win. The Tigers stayed with the Seahawks early, despite shooting poorly from the field. Yet, a couple of big shots from Andrija Sarenac late in the half stretched Keiser's lead to 37-27 before the break. In the second half, the Tigers had chances to break through and possibly take a lead, but Keiser was too much offensively. ONU failed to take advantage of the possessions they had, resulting in a 77-66 loss.

The Tigers were led by junior guard Tyler Crater's 18 points (3-for-6 on three-pointers) and three rebounds. Aaron Larson added 14 points (6-for-14) and six rebounds. Zach Wagner had 14 points (7-for-11), adding seven rebounds and three steals. Sophomore Chris Green finished with 10 points on 4-for-10 shooting. Alex Thorson had five points, 11 assists and six rebounds.

The first-round loss ended the career of seven Olivet seniors: NAIA Second Team All-American Aaron Larson, All-CCAC Honorable Mention selection Zach Wagner, Alex Thorson, Reid Farchmin, Leke Solanke, Taylor Tucker and Luke Steelman. Farchmin and Tucker were named Daktronics-NAIA Scholar-Athletes. Larson finished his career in the top 10 of six categories and among the top 20 in ONU history, finishing third in points (2,132). Wagner finished with 1,127 points to become the 41st Tiger in history to record 1,000 career points.
