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Overview

Olivet's *Annual Security & Fire Safety Report* is published annually in compliance with the Jeanne Clery Campus Safety Act (more commonly called the Clery Act). The purpose of this report is to provide students, prospective students, and employees with valuable information about safety and security at Olivet Nazarene University.

This report is compiled by Olivet's Department of Public Safety and contains statements of university security policy and crime statistics for the previous calendar year. The Fire Safety section of the report contains statistics and policies related to university fire safety as well as information about fire safety systems at Olivet. Reported statistics come from designated Campus Security Authorities in addition to other reports made to the Department of Public Safety and the Dean of Students office. The Bourbonnais Police Department and the Bourbonnais Fire Protection District also provide statistical data related to their engagements on or near university property.

ONU Department of Public Safety

The mission of the Olivet Nazarene University Department of Public Safety is to work in partnership with the campus community to protect and enhance a secure learning-centered environment, to provide quality service with an emphasis on integrity and professionalism, and to promote individual responsibility and cooperative commitment.

Olivet Nazarene University's Department of Public Safety is a private security organization dedicated to the safety and well-being of the campus community. The department's authority is established by the University President and Board of Trustees. When and if the need arises, Department of Public Safety officers are authorized to make a criminal complaint, pursuant to the Illinois Compiled Statutes, of any and all persons creating disturbances against the general peace, interfering with the security of campus facilities or grounds, or interfering with or disturbing the safety and the general welfare of the ONU community. When necessary, officers shall notify the Bourbonnais Police Department (BPD), which maintains criminal jurisdiction on campus, in accordance with the law.

The jurisdiction of the Department of Public Safety extends to all University-owned properties, some of which are physically separate from the core campus footprint. Officers have the authority to control access to University property, issue parking permits and citations in accordance with the University Vehicle Code, ask for proof of student or employee status (in the form of University identification, whether physical or digital), and enforce University personal conduct policies. Students who engage in illegal activity or who violate University conduct policies are referred to the Office of the Dean of Students for potential disciplinary action. Staff and faculty who engage in illegal activity or who violate University conduct policies are reported to the Office of Human Resources. Criminal offenses may also be reported to the appropriate law enforcement agency.

ONU Public Safety officers conduct regular security patrols across campus, lock and unlock classrooms and office areas at scheduled times, and make reports of safety and security hazards. ONU Public Safety is responsible for monitoring building access by authorized parties after hours and responds to all building alarms as needed. Several buildings and departmental study rooms are available 24 hours a day by request, for academic use by students, provided the students meet criteria established in advance by the respective department and are not in violation of other University policies.

ONU Public Safety is not a sworn law enforcement agency and does not have arrest powers. However, the department has a strong working relationship with the Bourbonnais Police Department. Public Safety officers and BPD officers communicate regularly on the scene of incidents that occur in and around the campus area, especially when incidents arise that require joint investigative efforts, resources, crime related reports and exchanges of information, as deemed necessary. BPD officers are on site for ONU chapel services as well as other large events such as athletics games and concerts.

ONU Public Safety and BPD have an Information Sharing agreement in place so Public Safety can access police reports relating to the University. Additionally, in the spirit of cooperation and mutual benefit, Olivet has granted BPD permanent access to all of our external surveillance cameras, some of which capture footage on public roadways and other village properties.

The Olivet Public Safety staff occasionally works with other law enforcement agencies in Kankakee County, including the Kankakee County Sheriff's Department, the Bradley Police Department, the Illinois State Police, and other law enforcement agencies.

ONU Public Safety also maintains a close working relationship with the Bourbonnais Fire Protection District (BFPD). Public Safety officers and BFPD communicate regularly on the scene of incidents that occur in and around the campus area. Public Safety officers work closely with the BFPD when incidents arise that requires joint efforts, resources, and exchanges of information, as deemed necessary.

We rely on these relationships for support on several levels. In addition to sharing critical information, the Department of Public Safety has immediate contact with 911 services through the Bourbonnais Police Department, the Bourbonnais Fire Protection District and the Kankakee County Communications Center. This arrangement gives the University immediate access to mutual aid and support from all area emergency service agencies.

The ONU Department of Public Safety is committed to providing information regarding campus safety, security, crime and fire prevention. This information may be communicated in the following ways, which are not exhaustive:

- During the course of the academic year, security issues are discussed at residence hall meetings and other student training meetings.
- Security information is printed annually in the Public Safety section within the University Life Handbook.
- Information is also available at the Public Safety page on My.Olivet, my.olivet.edu, and on the Olivet website.
- As time and resources allow, and in consideration of specific University needs, the Public Safety Department will also facilitate various safety awareness campaigns for the campus community.

REPORTING CRIME, SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY & EMERGENCIES

It is imperative that all crime, suspicious activity, and emergencies be reported accurately and promptly, although a victim always maintains his or her right to not report. However, when a victim elects to make a report, *or is unable to make a report*, crimes must be reported to the Department of Public Safety in addition to Bourbonnais Police or the appropriate police agency. All students, employees, and guests are encouraged to make reports as noted below. Additionally, those designated by the University as Campus Security Authorities (CSAs) are required to share any reports they receive on Clery-specific crimes with the Department of Public Safety.

VOLUNTARY CONFIDENTIAL REPORTING

If you are a victim of a crime and do not want to pursue action within the University system or the criminal justice system, you may want to consider making a confidential report.

The purpose of a confidential report is to maintain confidentiality, while taking steps to ensure the future safety of yourself and others. With such information, the University can keep an accurate record of the number of incidents involving students, employees and visitors; determine where there is a pattern of crime regarding a particular location, method, or assailant; and alert the campus community to potential dangers. Confidential reports get counted and disclosed with Olivet's annual crime statistics but do not contain any personally identifiable information. However, when such reports involve allegations of sexual harassment (including sexual violence), they are made available to the University's Title IX Coordinator.

To make a confidential report, contact ONU Public Safety using one of the methods listed above. Tell the administrative assistant or officer that you would like to make a confidential report with an officer or the Director of Public Safety.

A second confidential reporting option is to use the [Silent Witness Form](#), available on the University website. This tool allows information about suspected or confirmed criminal activity to be anonymously reported to the ONU Department of Public Safety without identifying the person(s) submitting a report.

ONU Public Safety will not attempt to make contact with persons who submit a Silent Witness Form (except in cases where there exists the potential for imminent danger for the person submitting the report or potential danger to the University and its community). ONU Public Safety will investigate claims made in the report to remedy safety and/or crime concerns or take proactive measures toward education and/or crime prevention.

POLICY STATEMENT ADDRESSING COUNSELORS

Campus “pastoral counselors” and campus “professional counselors,” when acting as such, are not considered to be a Campus Security Authority and are not required to report crimes for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics. As a matter of policy, they are encouraged — when they deem it appropriate — to inform persons being counseled of the procedures to report crimes on a voluntary basis for inclusion in the annual crime statistics. Pastoral and professional counselors are defined as follows:

- Pastoral Counselor — A person who is associated with a religious order or denomination, is recognized by that religious order or denomination as someone who provides confidential counseling and is functioning within the scope of that recognition as a pastoral counselor.
- Professional Counselor — A person whose official responsibilities include providing mental health counseling to members of the institution’s community and who is functioning within the scope of his or her license or certification.

LOCAL CRIME MONITORING & OFF-CAMPUS CRIME REPORTING

ONU does not maintain a system for monitoring crimes committed by or perpetrated against ONU students while off campus. Additionally, ONU does not have any officially recognized student organizations with property at noncampus locations.

When off campus, members of the ONU community are encouraged to report all crimes and public safety related incidents to the local police agency in a timely manner. Always call 911 in case of emergency.

DAILY CRIME & FIRE REPORTS

The ONU Department of Public Safety maintains a Daily Crime and Fire log that records, by the date the incident was reported, all crimes, fire activity and other serious incidents that occur on campus, in a non-campus building or property, on public property, or within the department’s patrol jurisdiction.

The Daily Crime and Fire log, containing the most recent 60 days, is available for public inspection at the Department of Public Safety office located in the lower level of Ludwig Center, on the main University campus at One University Avenue, Bourbonnais, Illinois. It is also available online at: <https://www.olivet.edu/public-safety-and-parking/>.

The log includes the nature, date, time and general location of each criminal incident reported to Public Safety, as well as the disposition of the complaint. Entries are posted within two business days of Public Safety receiving a report except in certain circumstances when posting an entry may jeopardize an investigation or the safety of an individual.

CAMPUS SAFETY, SECURITY & ACCESS

ACCESS TO CAMPUS FACILITIES

Despite being private property, Olivet Nazarene University is an open campus. In addition to the Olivet community, local community members enjoy walking or riding bikes through our beautiful campus.

Except for residence halls, most campus facilities are open during weekday business hours. Individuals who wish to access University buildings or property during non-business hours or for special events should contact the appropriate department administrator, Conference Services, or the Department of Public Safety.

For doors that are locked/unlocked with a physical key, department supervisors authorize which employees need which keys based on their job function. Campus keys are managed by the Physical Plant Department. Access to some campus doors is controlled electronically and requires access via a swipe card or smartphone app. Access to and lock/unlock timing of these doors is managed by Olivet's Information Technology department. As resources allow, more campus doors are being equipped with this technology.

SPECIAL PERMISSIONS – BUILDING ACCESS

Arrangements to open buildings for special programs that are scheduled through the University should be made with the Department of Public Safety, utilizing the Astra scheduling software system. Upon request, faculty and staff will be given access to their offices, if needed. Any student wishing to utilize University facilities after hours must have written approval from a university official for the specific area.

STUDENT HOUSING

Olivet Nazarene University is a residential campus with seven on-campus residence halls, one on-campus apartment complex, and four off-campus apartment complexes. ONU does not have any student groups or organizations that maintain its own off-campus housing.

RESIDENCE HALLS & APARTMENTS

For personal safety and for the protection of personal belongings, residents should keep the doors to their rooms and apartments locked at all times. Exterior doors should never be propped or left open as this greatly increases the opportunity for unauthorized entry to the building.

Access to residence halls is restricted to residents, their approved guests and other approved members of the University community. Each resident has electronic swipe access enabled on their smartphone or on a physical ID card. This enables authorized residents to enter their assigned living space and restricts unauthorized users from entering. The main doors of the six inner campus dorms are unlocked during the day so the lobbies can be accessed. However, interior doors leading to stairwells or hallways are always locked and only accessible via phone/card swipe technology. Guests of residents must be accompanied at all times by the resident they are visiting. Residents are cautioned against permitting strangers to enter the buildings. ONU's Department of Public Safety officers patrol campus grounds on a regular basis and work with Resident Directors and Resident Assistants to enforce safety and security measures.

Inner campus dorms are locked and exterior swipe access turned off at curfew (1:00am) and unlocked / swipe access turned on at 6:00am. Access to dorms after curfew is via the main entrance of the residence

hall and must be arranged by contacting the Department of Public Safety. Public Safety officers will only grant access after verifying a student’s name/ID number and that he/she lives in the dorm.

Campus apartment buildings and apartment units are accessed by a physical key. Keys are assigned to students as part of the move-in process and collected from students during the check-out process. Lock cores are routinely inspected and replaced as necessary to maintain their structural integrity.

SECURITY CONSIDERATIONS - MAINTENANCE OF CAMPUS FACILITIES

Olivet Nazarene University is committed to campus safety and security. Exterior lighting and landscape control is a critical part of that commitment. Representatives from various departments routinely conduct security surveys to ensure campus lighting is adequate and that the landscape is appropriately controlled. Recent upgrades to outdoor lighting have been made for the Grand Apartments (2023), Benner Library and Larsen Fine Arts (2024), and the Quad (2025). If lights are out or dim, officers will initiate a work order, which gets addressed by staff from the Physical Plant. The Department of Public Safety and the Physical Plant Department also work together to identify inoperative locking mechanisms and problems with doors.

All university employees, students, or campus guests are encouraged to report problems with doors, locks, lighting, or any other concern about unsafe facilities to Physical Plant at 815-939-5350 or Public Safety at 815-939-5265. The Department of Public Safety responds to calls 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

WEAPONS ON CAMPUS

Unless given special permission from the ONU Department of Public Safety, all weapons are prohibited on Olivet’s campus. With the exception of sworn police officers or other law enforcement officials, it is illegal to bring or possess ANY firearm on any Illinois school, college or university campus. Firearm restrictions include, but may not be limited to, any air soft gun, air gun, including pellet and BB guns that utilize air, CO2, or spring pressure to propel a projectile, or any toy gun which strongly resembles a real gun. In addition to firearms, large knives (blades over 3” in length), switchblade knives, swords, dirks, daggers and ice picks are prohibited, as well as slingshots and explosives of any kind (including fireworks).

If any person is seen carrying or concealing a weapon on any property owned, operated, or controlled by Olivet Nazarene University, information should immediately be reported to the Department of Public Safety and/or 911. If any person is in possession of a weapon on campus, he or she must immediately remove it from campus. The ONU Department of Public Safety reserves the right to confiscate any device that is or could be deemed dangerous or hazardous to self or others.

The ONU Department of Public Safety does not normally store weapons for convenience but may, in some circumstances, facilitate the temporary safekeeping of weapons until permanent storage is identified.

WORKPLACE / CAMPUS VIOLENCE

Olivet Nazarene University will not tolerate violence or threats on campus or in connection with University events. Individuals who violate this policy statement may be subject to disciplinary action up to and possibly including expulsion or termination of employment. Individuals who intentionally bring false charges against another will also be subject to disciplinary action up to and possibly including expulsion or termination of employment.

TIMELY WARNINGS & EMERGENCY NOTIFICATIONS

Anyone with information believed to warrant a timely warning or emergency notification should report the circumstances to the Department of Public Safety, by phone (815-939-5265) or in person. For any crime or emergency, it is always appropriate to first contact local emergency services at 911.

Timely Warnings

Timely warnings will be sent out as soon as pertinent information is available when ONU Public Safety becomes aware of a Clery crime, reported to a CSA or local law enforcement, that occurs within Clery geography, and that presents a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community. The decision to issue a warning is made on a case-by-case basis and rests with the Public Safety Department, including the Director of Public Safety, the Director of Emergency Management, and the Executive Director of Campus Safety. A timely warning decision tree will be used to determine appropriate action and document the decision. If it can happen in a timely fashion, consultation may also be had with members of the Emergency Management Team prior to sending the message, but this is not required.

All timely warnings will be sent to the entire Olivet community and will contain details of the crime including time, location, and the type of crime as well as information that promotes safety among the campus community and allows individuals to protect themselves. Timely warnings will not include specific names or information that might lead to the victim being identified.

Emergency Notifications

Emergency notifications get sent for dangerous situations that pose an immediate threat to the health or safety of some or all members of the ONU community. Upon confirmation of such an incident, Olivet Nazarene University will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the ONU community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system. The only exception would be if, in the professional judgment of officials from responding agencies, issuing a notification will compromise efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The Director of Public Safety, Director of Emergency Management, and Executive Director of Campus Safety have the responsibility to confirm an incident although only one of them needs to confirm it to initiate the emergency notification. In the case of a weather emergency, confirmation could come from first-hand awareness (i.e., looking outside) or information obtained from official weather sources. The confirmation process for other emergencies would rely on notification from Public Safety officers, campus officials, or local law enforcement or other agencies.

Due to the size of Olivet's campus, most emergency notifications will go to the entire campus community. However, it is possible that some emergency notifications would be sent to a smaller, segmented group on the campus, such as if there was an incident impacting residents of the Olde Oak or Stratford Apartments. The decision for determining whether segmentation is necessary will be made based on a review of the facts available when considering who is most likely to be at risk. This decision will be made by one or more of the three positions listed earlier in this section.

Communication Systems

Timely warnings and emergency notifications will be issued via Olivet's Mass Emergency Notification System (OMENS). OMENS uses the web-based Regroup messaging service to send email to all Olivet email addresses and text messages to registered cell phone numbers. All primary cell phone numbers in Colleague will receive the text as well as any other numbers that have been manually added or opted-in.

To verify that mobile phone numbers are current, University students and employees need to access their [Self-Service User Profile](#) (My.Olivet.edu → Self-Service → User Profile). Parents or others on campus who aren't students/employees can opt-in to receive alerts by texting **join onualerts** to 31002.

Additional communication methods may also be used including:

- Voice messaging through University phone equipment
- Posting of information on the Olivet website or the my.olivet.edu portal site
- University-wide "pop-up" messaging for University computers logged on to the University network, as well as ONU installed and operational TVs

For those with authorization to send a timely warning or emergency notification, initiating the notification system involves logging in to Regroup from a desktop computer or mobile device, selecting an existing message template or drafting an ad-hoc message, and choosing the appropriate audience to receive the notification.

Message Content and Permissions

The following positions on campus have the authority and technical permissions to physically send out timely warnings and emergency notifications via OMENS/Regroup:

- Executive Director of Campus Safety
- Director of Emergency Management
- Director of Public Safety
- Director of Risk Management
- Director of Infrastructure Operations (if requested by one of the first four)

Timely warning and emergency notification templates are developed and reviewed in advance by the members of Olivet's Emergency Management Team and are available within Regroup for quick access. Before final dissemination, the content of the final messages will be slightly modified from the templates in order to include relevant, incident-specific information.

DATING VIOLENCE, DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, SEXUAL ASSAULT, STALKING (DVSAS)

OFFICIAL POLICY STATEMENT

Olivet Nazarene University prohibits the crimes of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking.

All students, faculty, staff and visitors are subject to this policy statement. Violators may be subject to discipline including, but not limited to, termination, expulsion or other appropriate institutional sanctions. Prosecution by the criminal and/or civil justice system may also occur. ONU affiliates (students, faculty,

staff, visitors) suspected and/or accused of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking (DVSAS) may be subject to disciplinary proceedings as per University policy. The University urges any individual who has been a victim of DVSAS crimes to report the incident to the Department of Public Safety or another trusted University official. Reporting is a right and is encouraged, even if the victim opts not to pursue legal prosecution, so that the University can make resources available to the reporting victim to assist in the healing process.

IF YOU ARE A VICTIM OF DVSAS

From a University perspective, the first priority is to ensure the victim's safety. Those who may have experienced dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking are encouraged to not be afraid to seek medical attention and/or contact the ONU Department of Public Safety, or another trusted University official, for the provision of resources, professional assistance and guidance.

If you have been sexually assaulted, seek medical attention immediately. For the purpose of preserving evidence and not disturbing the crime scene, victims should not shower, change clothes, or disturb the scene of the attack, but should go to the emergency room of a hospital. It is suggested that a friend always accompany the victim to the hospital, if possible.

Whether a hospital visit is needed or not, it is always important to preserve evidence in any DVSAS incident. A forensic exam at a hospital is one method of preservation. Taking photos and saving all correspondence with the alleged perpetrator are other ways to preserve evidence. This evidence could help prove an alleged crime and/or assist in obtaining an order of protection.

SERVICES TO VICTIMS OF DVSAS

Following a report of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking, ONU will provide the student or employee a written explanation of their rights and options, including the following:

- Private meeting for reporting and guidance referrals at a time and place determined by the victim.
- Assistance with reporting the incident to law enforcement, if the victim chooses to report the crime.
- Assurance of confidentiality regarding reporting and associated choices and investigation.
- Assistance with notice of the crime to individual(s) designated by the victim, if the victim chooses to give this type of notice.
- A list of resources within the University and the local community related to counseling, health, legal assistance, mental health, victim advocacy, visa and immigration assistance, & student financial aid.
- A detailed overview of the institution's procedures for disciplinary action related to DVSAS crimes.
- Assistance in arranging accommodations, within 24 hours of receipt of report, related to housing, academics, transportation, employment, and protective measures.
 - Accommodations are accessible upon request by the victim provided they are reasonably available, regardless of whether a formal report was made to ONU Public Safety or local law enforcement.
 - To request accommodations, contact the Title IX Coordinator (815-928-5473) or the Dean of Students (815-939-5333).

RESPONSE PROCEDURES

Olivet Nazarene University has extensive policies and procedures that cover sexual violence. The [Sex Discrimination & Sex-Based Policy and Procedures](#) document is linked from the Title IX resources page on the Olivet website. The policies and procedures apply to the Clery Act crimes of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking and they are applicable to students and employees.

Reporting: Any information related to the crimes mentioned above should be reported to Olivet's Title IX Coordinator. All Olivet employees are considered designated reporters under Title IX and as such a report could be made to any employee which would also make its way to the Title IX Coordinator.

Reports can also be made to Campus Security Authorities (CSAs) as described earlier in this report.

Forensic Examinations: Obtaining a forensic examination will help victims preserve evidence which could benefit a future police report—but getting an examination does not require someone to file a police report. Further information about forensic exams, including where to obtain one, is provided to victims by the University's designated Confidential Advisor. Victims can seek out additional resources from the Rape, Abuse & Incest National Network (RAINN): <https://rainn.org> or 800-656-HOPE.

Confidentiality: Olivet is committed to protecting the privacy of all individuals who are involved in a report. The Title IX Coordinator oversees the entire reporting and investigation process, including the adherence to confidentiality, and is responsible for determining what information about a victim should be disclosed and to whom this information will be disclosed. Personally identifiable information will not be included in any publicly available records, including Clery Act reporting and the extent that any accommodations or protective measures can be given and kept confidential, they will be.

REPORTING DVSAS CRIMES

Information on reporting dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking is provided in writing to victims. Reporting DVSAS crimes is a right belonging to all victims, but a victim also has the right to decline making a report to local police or the ONU Department of Public Safety. However, the University encourages making a report and is able to assist the victim in doing so. This may seem intimidating, but there is no need to be afraid. Police officers are trained to handle such situations with sensitivity and compassion. Victims should feel free to bring a friend or advocate to any police interview about the assault.

- For DVSAS incidents that occurs on ONU properties, contact the ONU Department of Public Safety at 815-939-5265, or call the Bourbonnais Police Department at 911 (for emergencies) or the non-emergency number at 815-937-3577.
- For off campus incidents, victims may also feel free to contact the ONU Department of Public Safety as noted above, or the local police department for the city in which the incident occurred.

When a DVSAS case is reported to the police department, the assigned officer will respond and meet the victim in a location preferred by the victim. The victim may request to speak with a male or female officer, depending on personal preference (if there is a preference). The officer will take a preliminary statement in order to obtain the basic facts of the case and will likely recommend the victim seek medical attention as a result of the crime.

Regardless of the choice, the ONU Department of Public Safety and the University will respect the decision of the victim as to whether criminal charges are pursued. Nevertheless, the victim is encouraged to report the crime and the name of the accused so that necessary resources can be dedicated to prevent future incidents from occurring. Reporting also enables the victim to receive information about expanded support services. Additionally, properly reporting DVSAS crimes can help the victim regain a sense of personal power and control over the situation.

DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES

University proceedings related to dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking, will provide a prompt, fair, and impartial investigation and resolution. They will also be conducted by officials who receive annual training on 1) the issues related to dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking, and 2) how to conduct an investigation and hearing process that protects the safety of victims and promotes accountability. The standard of evidence used in these proceedings is Preponderance of the Evidence.

The accuser and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a disciplinary proceeding and can be accompanied to any related meeting or proceeding by an advisor of their choice. Both the accuser and the accused shall be simultaneously notified in writing of:

- the outcome of any disciplinary proceeding arising from an allegation of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking;
- the procedures for the accused and the victim to appeal the results of the disciplinary proceeding;
- any change to the results that occurs prior to the time that such results become final; and
- when such results become final.

Upon request, for any disciplinary proceeding conducted by the University against a student who is the alleged perpetrator of any crime of violence or a non-forcible sex offense, ONU will disclose the results to the alleged victim or the next of kin if the victim is deceased.

RISK REDUCTION FOR SEXUAL ASSAULT

Although we cannot guarantee that you will never be a victim, there are steps you can take to minimize those chances. The following are suggestions to incorporate into daily routines:

On the Street

- Avoid walking alone, especially at night.
- Be aware of what is happening in your surroundings. Know where you are and where you are going.
- If you walk regularly, vary your route. Do not be predictable! Walk away from bushes, alleys and dark entryways. Stay in well-lighted areas.
- Take precaution to prevent being surprised. Attackers rely on the element of surprise. Do not wear headphones when walking alone.
- Trust your instincts. If you think you are being followed, walk toward a busy, lighted area. Scream loudly to attract attention and tell someone to call the police.
- If someone bothers you from a car, turn and walk in the opposite direction. If possible, get a license plate number. When you are in a safe place, call 911 and notify the Department of Public Safety.

Jogging in Athletic Parks and Streets

- When possible, run with a friend or in a group.

- Try to avoid running alone during the evening hours.

In Your Vehicle

- Always have keys in your hand as you approach your vehicle. Avoid having to look through bags or purses to find keys.
- Always maintain focus and attention on surroundings. Be aware of what is happening around you.
- Always look inside your vehicle, in the back seat and on the floor before you get into it.
- Upon entry to your vehicle, immediately lock doors. Keep the car doors locked and your windows up when driving.
- Always have your cell phone with you and have plenty of gasoline in your vehicle.
- Know how to change a flat tire. Make certain that the spare tire is in good condition and that the proper auto safety equipment is in your car.
- If your car breaks down at night, turn on your emergency flashers. Remain in your car with the doors locked and the windows closed until the police arrive.
- If another motorist stops to assist you, roll the window down slightly, and ask him or her to call the police or a towing service.

BYSTANDER INTERVENTION

People sometimes fail to intervene when another person is in trouble. Reasons for this include fear for their own safety, assuming someone else will act, or assuming the situation is not actually a problem or none of their business. Bystanders can keep their friends and others safe by actively helping to prevent incidents before they occur.

Anyone who witnesses a violent incident taking place is urged to call 911 immediately. If an incident occurs on campus or other University property, after calling 911, also contact ONU Public Safety at **815-939-5265**. If a friend shares with you that they have been a victim of sexual assault, dating/domestic violence, or stalking, encourage them to contact the Bourbonnais Police or ONU Public Safety.

ILLINOIS DEFINITIONS

Dating Violence

Dating Violence is not defined in the Illinois criminal code. Persons who have or have had a dating or engagement relationship are included with the Domestic Violence definition.

Domestic Violence

Domestic Violence/Persons Protected (750 ILCS 60/103 and 60/201 (2014)):

Means physical abuse, harassment, intimidation of a dependent, interference with personal liberty or willful deprivation of (1) any person by a family or household member; or (2) any high-risk adult with disabilities by a family or household member; or (3) any minor child or dependent adult in the care of such person; or (4) any person residing or employed at a private home or public shelter which is housing an abused family or household member.

Family or Household Members (750 ILCS 60/103(6) (2014)):

Include spouses, former spouses, parents, children, stepchildren and other persons related by blood or by present or prior marriage, persons who share or formerly shared a common dwelling, persons who have or allegedly have a child in common, persons who share or allegedly share a blood relationship through a child, persons who have or have had a dating or engagement relationship, persons with disabilities and their personal assistants, and caregivers as defined in Section 12-4.4a of the Criminal Code of 2012 [720 ILCS 5/12-4.4a]. For purposes of this paragraph, neither a casual

acquaintanceship nor ordinary fraternization between 2 individuals in business or social contexts shall be deemed to constitute a dating relationship.

Sexual Assault

Criminal Sexual Assault (720 ILCS 5/11-1.20 (2014)):

A person commits criminal sexual assault if that person commits an act of sexual penetration and: (1) uses force or threat of force; (2) knows that the victim is unable to understand the nature of the act or is unable to give knowing consent; (3) is a family member of the victim, and the victim is under 18 years of age; or (4) is 17 years of age or over and holds a position of trust, authority, or supervision in relation to the victim, and the victim is at least 13 years of age but under 18 years of age.

Aggravated Criminal Sexual Assault (720 ILCS 5/11-1.30 (2014)):

(a) a person commits aggravated criminal sexual assault if that person commits criminal sexual assault and any of the following aggravating circumstances exist during the commission of the offense or, for purposes of paragraph (7), occur as part of the same course of conduct as the commission of the offense:

- 1) the person displays threatens to use, or uses a dangerous weapon, other than a firearm, or any other object fashioned or used in a manner that leads the victim, under the circumstances, reasonably to believe that the object is a dangerous weapon;
- 2) the person causes bodily harm to the victim, except as provided in paragraph (10);
- 3) the person acts in a manner that threatens or endangers the life of the victim or any other person;
- 4) the person commits the criminal sexual assault during the course of committing or attempting to commit any other felony;
- 5) the victim is 60 years of age or older;
- 6) the victim is a physically handicapped person;
- 7) the person delivers (by injection, inhalation, ingestion, transfer of possession, or any other means) any controlled substance to the victim without the victim's consent or by threat or deception for other than medical purposes;
- 8) the person is armed with a firearm;
- 9) the person personally discharges a firearm during the commission of the offense; or
- 10) the person personally discharges a firearm during the commission of the offense, and that discharge proximately causes great bodily harm, permanent disability, permanent disfigurement, or death to another person.

(b) a person commits aggravated criminal sexual assault if that person is under 17 years of age and: (i) commits an act of sexual penetration with a victim who is under 9 years of age; or (ii) commits an act of sexual penetration with a victim who is at least 9 years of age but under 13 years of age and the person uses force or threat of force to commit the act.

(c) A person commits aggravated criminal sexual assault if that person commits an act of sexual penetration with a victim who is a severely or profoundly intellectually disabled person.

Stalking

Stalking (720 ILCS 5/12-7.3 (2014)):

(a) A person commits stalking when he or she knowingly engages in a course of conduct directed at a specific person, and he or she knows or should know that this course of conduct would cause a reasonable person to: (1) fear for his or her safety or the safety of a third person; or (2) suffer other emotional distress.

(a-3) A person commits stalking when he or she, knowingly and without lawful justification, on at least 2 separate occasions follows another person or places the person under surveillance or any combination thereof and: (1) at any time transmits a threat of immediate or future bodily harm, sexual assault, confinement or restraint and the threat is directed towards that person or a family member of that person; or (2) places that person in reasonable apprehension of immediate or future bodily harm, sexual assault, confinement or restraint to or of that person or a family member of that person.

(a-5) A person commits stalking when he or she has previously been convicted of stalking another person and knowingly and without lawful justification on one occasion: (1) follows that same person or places that same person

under surveillance; and (2) transmits a threat of immediate or future bodily harm, sexual assault, confinement or restraint to that person or a family member of that person.

(a-7) A person commits stalking when he or she knowingly makes threats that are a part of a course of conduct and is aware of the threatening nature of his or her speech.

Consent

In the Illinois law addressing criminal sexual assault, "consent" is defined as, "a freely given agreement to the act of sexual penetration or sexual conduct in question. Lack of verbal or physical resistance or submission by the victim resulting from the use of force or threat of force by the accused shall not constitute consent. The manner of dress of the victim at the time of the offense shall not constitute consent." 720 ILCS 5/11-1.70 (a) Further, "A person who initially consents to sexual penetration or sexual conduct is not deemed to have consented to any sexual penetration or sexual conduct that occurs after he or she withdraws consent during the course of that sexual penetration or sexual conduct." 720 ILCS 5/11-1.70(c). Finally, consent cannot be given by a person who is under the age of 17, except that it shall be a defense to a charge of criminal sexual assault if the accused reasonably believed the person to be 17 years of age or over. 720 ILCS 5/11-1.70(b).

VICTIMS OF CRIME

The Department of Public Safety and the University will treat all victims with respect, state rights and legal options clearly, and cooperate fully with them in exercising those rights. All victims have the right to report the offense to the police. Victims of sexual assault have the right to full and prompt cooperation and assistance in obtaining evidence that is necessary for proof of criminal sexual assault, including a medical examination, the right to freedom from pressure by campus authorities to report crimes as lesser offenses, and the right to be made fully aware of and assisted in exercising state or federal legal rights to test sexual assault suspects for communicable diseases.

The University provides counseling services through the Counseling Services department located in the Elwood Center. The counseling services are voluntary and without charge. A professional code of ethics is observed. In addition, Olivet Nazarene University maintains working relationships with several local providers of medical care, including, but not limited to, St. Mary's Hospital and Riverside Medical Center.

EDUCATION AND PREVENTION PROGRAMS

- Primary
 - All employees are required to complete Title IX and Sexual Harassment training each year. These are video modules and quizzes pushed out through the Vector Solutions learning management system.
 - All students are also emailed Title IX training through Vector Solutions which includes information on how to identify sexual violence and harassment, how to report it, and information on ways to prevent it from happening.
- Ongoing
 - Residential Life staff are educated on Title IX by the Title IX Coordinator and also provided with resources from Clove Alliance, the local agency that works with sexual assault victims and helps educate the community.
 - Links to the [Sex-Based Policy and Procedures](#) document and the [University Life Handbook](#) are emailed out to all students at the beginning of the fall semester.
 - THRIVE (Counseling Center) emailed info to all students related to Stalking Awareness Month – January 9, 2025
 - Activities/Events for Sexual Assault Awareness Month (April)
 - Walk & Talk – April 7, 2025

- Hosted by THRIVE, this event is an opportunity to learn more about sexual assault awareness in a relaxed, casual environment.
- Emails were sent and flyers posted around campus to promote the event.
- Denim Day – April 30, 2025
 - Students and employees are encouraged to wear denim on this day as a way of showing support for victims of sexual violence and educating people on common misconceptions.
 - Emails were sent and flyers posted around campus to promote the event.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE & EVACUATION POLICIES

Olivet Nazarene University's Department of Public Safety and Office of Emergency Management are committed to partnering with University administrators, departmental leaders, and community emergency response agencies to ensure that adequate policies, training programs, and resources are in place to enable the University to respond effectively to any type of emergency situation.

The University's Emergency Operations Plan outlines the University's response to emergencies by taking an all-hazards approach to both natural and human-caused hazards. The Department of Public Safety and other University staff involved with emergency response activities are trained in the Incident Command System (ICS) and Emergency Operations Center team members participate in an annual training where ONU-specific emergency scenarios are discussed in a table-top format. Further scenario-based discussions and emergency planning activities happen in quarterly meetings of Olivet's Emergency Management Team.

DRILLS AND TRAINING

Campus-wide evacuation drills are held at least once during each academic year, addressing fire, tornado, or both. Information about these drills is communicated to employees and the Bourbonnais Fire Department weeks in advance of the drill. Closer to the date of the drill, students receive notification that a drill will take place, but not the specifics of exactly when it will happen. Documentation is kept for these drills indicating a description of the drill, the date and time, and whether it was announced or unannounced. After-action reports are submitted to help identify issues and evaluate needed improvements. Public Safety has designated evacuation assembly points and severe weather areas of refuge for each campus building. The feasibility of these locations and the logistics of moving building occupants to them are assessed during the drills. Individual building safety teams may also conduct building-specific exercises on their own schedule.

At the beginning of each fall semester, University employees are required to watch training videos on emergency procedures (fire, tornado, active threat, medical emergency) and run-hide-fight protocols. The emergency procedures video is also shown to students in their classes on the first two days of the fall semester. These videos are posted on the Public Safety and Emergency Management pages of the My Olivet portal and are also shared with students via email. A one-page document outlining emergency procedures is attached with an email notice to students and employees about the drills. This document is also accessible on the portal and is posted in campus buildings.

Tests are also conducted with campus IT on emergency communication tools including Regroup messaging and the campus phone paging system. These tests are designed to assess and evaluate the emergency plans and capabilities of the institution.

Additional training for the campus community includes fire extinguisher training and CPR and AED training, coordinated by the Department of Public Safety; and Stop the Bleed training conducted by local medical professionals and hosted by the Office of Emergency Management.

FIRE ALARM POLICY

Upon activation of the fire alarm system, all persons shall evacuate their residence hall, dorm, house, lab, classroom, office, or any other building or structure, and meet at the predetermined evacuation assembly point (as per campus fire safety drills and the list of buildings posted on My Olivet). For large outdoor venues, attendees should proceed toward the nearest exit and follow any verbal directions provided by safety personnel or event management, when applicable.

As is always the case, and including during an evacuation, people should maintain situational awareness and be vigilant for dangerous or criminal activity. Bad actors intent on doing harm to others, have at times created a diversion or activated a fire alarm in an attempt to gather people in one location. Were this to happen, seek safety from the most immediate threat, disregarding the fire alarm if necessary, and alert others (and 911) to this criminal activity.

CRIME PREVENTION & SAFETY AWARENESS

OLIVET NAZARENE UNIVERSITY ENCOURAGES STUDENTS AND EMPLOYEES TO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR THEIR OWN SAFETY AND FOR THE SAFETY OF OTHERS ON CAMPUS.

As stated earlier in this report, it is beneficial for the entire community when crime, suspicious activity, and emergencies are reported accurately and promptly. When a victim elects to do so, or is unable to do so, crimes must be reported to ONU Public Safety and Bourbonnais Police. Additionally, anyone who feels uncomfortable walking from a campus building or parking lot after dark may call **Public Safety at 815-939-5265** to request a ride across campus.

Each semester Public Safety emails a PDF document to all student and employees with personal safety tips for preventing crime and staying safe on campus. This document is also available to students and employees on Public Safety's page on the My Olivet portal.

At the beginning of each academic year, a link to the University Life Handbook (ULH) is emailed to all students who are encouraged to read it. In addition to official policies related to student life on campus, the ULH contains specific tips and general awareness about safety in student housing as well as information about regular Health and Safety Inspections made by residential life staff. The Public Safety Handbook is contained within the ULH and reiterates that safety is everyone's responsibility.

THREAT ASSESSMENT TEAM

The Campus Threat Assessment Team is another component of crime prevention at ONU. This team is comprised of key staff and faculty members who meet to review best practices, current trends and to consult about matters of concern that may pose a potential threat, (whether immediate or in the future), to the campus community. The Campus Threat Assessment Team is a multidisciplinary team that serves five functions for the University:

1. Provide consultation and support to faculty, staff and administration in assisting University students or employees who display concerning or disruptive behavior.
2. Gather information to assess situations involving University students, employees, or unaffiliated individuals who display concerning or disruptive behavior.
3. Recommend appropriate intervention strategies or disciplinary sanctions.
4. Monitor ongoing behavior of those who have displayed concerning or disruptive behavior.
5. Serve as the consulting authority for review of the University's Violence Prevention Plan.

MISSING STUDENT POLICY

If any individual becomes concerned that a student might be missing, notification should immediately be given to Olivet's Public Safety Department, including any reports made to other university departments or offices. Upon receipt of this information, ONU Public Safety will generate a missing person report and conduct a missing person investigation. The student's missing person emergency contact will also be notified within 24 hours.

There is a misconception that friends, loved ones and colleagues cannot be reported missing until they have been missing for at least 24 hours. This is not true. A report of a missing student may be made at any time someone is believed to be missing. Anyone may file a missing person report (friend, relative, coworker). If a student has not returned home, failed to appear for work, class, or for an appointment as anticipated, or if there is belief that something suspicious has occurred, or if there is concern regarding possible foul play regarding the student's absence, the situation should immediately be reported to ONU Public Safety.

Federal law mandates that the University provide students with an option of specifying a person(s) with whom contact should be made in the event he or she has been determined to be a missing person. Students and employees can designate a missing person emergency contact, by accessing Self-Service (My.Olivet.edu → Self-Service → User Options → Emergency Information).

Federal law also requires the University to inform students that the Bourbonnais Police Department and the missing person emergency contact will be notified within 24 hours of the person's being determined missing. For non-emancipated minors, a custodial parent or guardian will be notified within 24 hours in addition to any other listed missing person emergency contact(s).

All student contact information related to this policy will be stored confidentially. This information will be accessible only to authorized campus officials and may not be disclosed, except to law enforcement personnel in furtherance of a missing person investigation.

In addition to the minimum notifications that will be made under federal law, Olivet Nazarene University may make additional notifications as necessary, as provided by FERPA to resolve a safety emergency. This could include notifying parents or guardians even when they have not been specifically listed by a student as an emergency contact or a missing person emergency contact.

HAZING POLICY

OFFICIAL POLICY STATEMENT

The Stop Campus Hazing Act, enacted on December 23, 2024, amended the Clery Act to prioritize the prevention of and transparency about hazing incidents at colleges and universities. Olivet Nazarene University strictly prohibits hazing of any kind. Information about hazing, including the full anti-hazing policy, is available on the ONU website at this link: <https://www.olivet.edu/consumer-information/hazing>.

HAZING DEFINITION

ONU has adopted the Clery Act's definition of hazing: any intentional, knowing, or reckless act committed by a person (whether individually or in concert with other persons) against another person or persons regardless of the willingness of such other person or persons to participate, that:

- Is committed in the course of an initiation into, an affiliation with, or the maintenance of membership in, a student organization; and
- Causes or creates a risk of physical or psychological injury, above the reasonable risk encountered in the course of enrollment at ONU or the participation in an organization (such as the physical preparation necessary for participation in an athletic team or ROTC).

A violation of Olivet's anti-hazing policy is a serious offense of ONU Student Conduct and Community Standards. Investigation of reported hazing incidents will follow the student conduct process outlined in the University Life Handbook and the full range of university sanctions are possible up to and including permanent dismissal from ONU. When appropriate, ONU will cooperate with and refer cases to local law enforcement authorities for potential criminal prosecution.

Student organizations found responsible for hazing will also be sanctioned and the results of such investigations will be included in Olivet's [Campus Hazing Transparency Report](#).

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS

The University uses multiple ways to educate and inform the campus about its hazing policies, reporting procedures, and options for healthy group activities:

- Presentation given to resident assistants during their training week on August 20, 2025.
- Information shared at athletics coaches meeting on August 22, 2025.
- Training guide emailed to all campus group leaders on September 22, 2025.
- Email sent to all students and employees on September 23, 2025.
- Posters hung around campus during National Hazing Prevention Week, September 22-26, 2025.
- Infographics and other content posted throughout the year on Public Safety's bulletin board.

HAZING IN ILLINOIS

Under Illinois law (720 ILCS 5/12C-50), a person commits hazing when he or she knowingly requires the performance of any act by a student or other person in a school, college, university, or other educational institution of this State, for the purpose of induction or admission into any group, organization, or society associated or connected with that institution, if:

- (1) the act is not sanctioned or authorized by that educational institution; and
- (2) the act results in bodily harm to any person

It is not a defense to a prosecution that the person against whom the hazing was directed consented to or acquiesced in the hazing. In Illinois, hazing is a Class A misdemeanor, except that hazing that results in death or great bodily harm is a Class 4 felony. (Source: P.A. 103-765, eff. 1-1-25.)

SEX OFFENDER REGISTRY

Olivet Nazarene University is required to inform the campus community that a list of registered sex offenders and associated information is available at the following locations:

In addition, a list of registered sex offenders is available via the Illinois State Police Sex Offender Information website at <http://www.isp.illinois.gov/sor>. Bourbonnais is located in Kankakee County, and the ZIP Code is 60914.

In accordance with Illinois state law, and in addition to any other legal requirements one may have, any registered sex offender employed at or attending Olivet Nazarene University must register in person with the Director of Public Safety. This registration must be completed annually and will be forwarded on to the Bourbonnais Police Department.

DRUG & ALCOHOL-FREE CAMPUS & WORKPLACE

In compliance with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1989 and with Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act (DFSCA) Amendment of 1989, Olivet Nazarene University prohibits the unlawful possession, use or distribution of drugs, alcohol and unlawful substances by students or by employees on University property or as part of any University activities.

Olivet Nazarene University will impose sanctions on students and employees (consistent with local, state and federal laws) up to and including expulsion or termination of employment, and referral for prosecution for violation of standards of conduct. As the University campus is a smoke-free work environment, this includes the use of tobacco products. Enforcement of underage drinking laws and applicable drug laws is overseen by the Dean of Students and managed through the student conduct process.

The unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the workplace and as part of the campus environment, and violation of any of the aforementioned is cause for immediate dismissal. The “workplace” encompasses all of the Olivet Nazarene University locations. It is a student’s and/or an employee’s responsibility to notify the ONU Department of Public Safety of any criminal drug conviction occurring in the workplace no later than five days after conviction.

Substance Abuse Education and Prevention Programs

In addition to this annual report, policy information about drug, alcohol, and substance abuse is included 1) in the [University Life Handbook](#) which is emailed to students at the beginning of each year and posted on the University’s website, 2) in the Employee Handbook which lives on Olivet’s private intranet portal, and 3) on the University’s [Consumer Information](#) page, a link to which is emailed to students and employees twice each year. Students also sign a lifestyle covenant each year which acknowledges that they have read and understood the University’s policies.

Resident Assistants perform weekly “Health and Safety Inspections” in campus residences. These HSI’s can result in prohibited items being discovered such as drugs and alcohol. When found, the items are confiscated and the student conduct process is initiated for the appropriate student(s).

Olivet Nazarene University recognizes drug and alcohol dependency as treatable conditions. Resident Assistants attend a workshop during their pre-semester training week that covers various addictions including drug and alcohol abuse. Students requiring assistance are encouraged to avail themselves of the University’s Counseling Center, located in the Elwood Center for Student Success, which provides prevention, referral, and supportive resources, including counseling and health services.

Employees requiring assistance are encouraged to utilize the Employee Assistance Program (EAP), which provides confidential assessment, referral and short-term counseling for employees. The Office of Human Resources is available to help employees identify appropriate treatment resources and will refer them to treatment or rehabilitation programs, including the EAP.

CRIME STATISTICS

The annual crime and fire report information is collected and compiled by Public Safety staff under the direction of the Executive Director of Campus Safety Management. Information in this ASR is solicited from and reviewed by members of the Clery Compliance Committee.

The crime statistics in this report are published in accordance with the standards and guidelines used by the FBI Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook and relevant federal law. ONU submits the annual crime statistics published in this report to the Department of Education (ED). The statistical information gathered by the Department of Education is available to the public through the ED website. The procedures for preparing the annual disclosure of crime statistics include reporting statistics to the University community obtained from ONU's Department of Public Safety, Campus Security Authorities (CSAs), the Bourbonnais Police Department, and other local law enforcement agencies.

Crime statistics are recorded based on calls for service, complaints, and investigations for the calendar year in which the crime was reported and only when the crime occurs within Clery geography. Reported crimes may involve individuals not associated with ONU. For crimes occurring on non-campus properties outside the Bourbonnais Police Department jurisdiction, a written request for statistical information is made to the law enforcement agency with jurisdiction.

HATE CRIMES

Olivet Nazarene University strives to foster a safe and healthy learning environment that embodies diversity and inclusion of all members of the ONU community. Any primary criminal offense counted for Clery can also be classified as a Hate Crime. In addition, the crimes of Simple Assault, Intimidation, Larceny-Theft, and Destruction / Damage / Vandalism of Property are required to be reported if they were committed as a Hate Crime. Hate Crime statistics get reported to the Department of Education according to category of prejudice.

Note: A hate or bias-related crime is not a separate, distinct crime, but is the commission of a criminal offense which was motivated by the offender's bias. For example, a subject assaults a victim, which is a crime. If the facts of the case indicated that the offender was motivated to commit the offense because of his/her bias against the victim's race, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, national origin, religion, ethnicity or disability, the assault is then also classified as a hate/bias crime.

Hate crimes can be reported using any of the regular reporting methods mentioned earlier in this report.

DEFINITIONS OF CLERY GEOGRAPHY FOR CRIME REPORTING

On-Campus: Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area and used by the institution in direct support of or in a manner related to the institution's educational purposes, including residence halls, and any building or property that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is frequently used by students, and supports institutional purposes. Olivet includes all student residences in the On-Campus category.

Note: Statistics for University housing facilities are recorded and included in both the Main Campus – On-Campus category and the Main Campus – Residence Halls category.

Noncampus Building or Property: Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the institution; or any building or property owned or controlled by an institution that is used in direct support or in relation to the institution's educational purposes, is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution. The Noncampus category consists of Olivet's property at 21 Heritage and the Swanberg Sanctuary in Mومence.

Public Property: All public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks and parking facilities, that are within the campus or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus. The ONU crime statistics do not include crimes that occur in privately owned homes or businesses within or adjacent to the campus boundaries.

DEFINITIONS OF STATISTICAL CATEGORIES

Aggravated Assault: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious potential injury if the crime were successfully completed.

Arson: Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, or personal property.

Burglary: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes, this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or a felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Dating Violence: See Domestic Violence; in Illinois, that includes all dating violence.

Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property (Hate Crime only): To willfully or maliciously destroy, damage, deface, or otherwise injure real or personal property without the consent of the owner or the person having custody or control of it.

Domestic Violence: Includes felony or misdemeanor crimes of violence committed by a current or former spouse of the victim, by a person with whom the victim shares a child in common, by a person cohabitating with or who has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse or intimate partner, by a person in or formerly in a dating relationship with the victim, or by any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction.

Drug Abuse Violations: The violation of laws prohibiting the production, distribution, and/or use of certain controlled substances and the equipment or devices utilized in their preparation and/or use. The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation, or importation of any controlled drug or narcotic substance. Arrests for violations of State and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs.

Hazing: any intentional, knowing, or reckless act committed by a person (whether individually or in concert with other persons) against another person or persons regardless of the willingness of such other person or persons to participate, that:

- Is committed in the course of an initiation into, an affiliation with, or the maintenance of membership in, a student organization; and

- Causes or creates a risk, above the reasonable risk encountered in the course of participation in the institution of higher education or the organization (such as the physical preparation necessary for participation in an athletic team), of physical or psychological injury

Intimidation (Hate Crime only): To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.

Larceny-Theft (Hate Crime only): The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Attempted larcenies are included. Motor vehicle theft is excluded and recorded separately.

Liquor Law Violations: The violation of state or local laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transporting, possession, or use of alcoholic beverages, not including driving under the influence and drunkenness.

Murder/Non-Negligent Manslaughter: The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Motor Vehicle Theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. These crimes represent all cases where motor vehicles are taken by persons not having lawful access, even if the vehicles are later abandoned, including incidents of joy riding. (This category includes automobiles, trucks and buses, and smaller vehicles such as motorcycles, golf carts, ATVs, and motorized wheelchairs.)

Negligent Manslaughter: The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Robbery: The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Sexual Assault: An offense that meets the definition of rape, fondling, incest, or statutory rape as used in the FBI's UCR program.

Simple Assault (Hate Crime only): An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness.

Stalking: Engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to: **a)** fear for his or her safety or the safety of others; or **b)** suffer substantial emotional distress.

Weapon Law Violations: The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosives, incendiary devices, or other deadly weapons.

ROOMMATES & DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STATISTICS

The State of Illinois includes roommates in its definition of Domestic Violence. However, this was not the intention of the Clery Act and, as such, the Department of Education allows institutions to choose whether or not to include roommates in this statistic. Olivet Nazarene University has chosen not to include roommates in the Domestic Violence statistics listed below. To be categorized as Domestic Violence, the relationship between the accuser and the accused must be more than just two people living together as roommates.

FIRE SAFETY REPORT

FIRE SAFETY

Olivet Nazarene University publishes this fire safety report as part of its annual Clery Compliance. This report contains information regarding the fire safety practices and standards for ONU, including statistics concerning the number of fires, the cause of each fire, and the number of any injuries or deaths related to a fire. This report is available for review 24 hours a day on the ONU website at olivet.edu. A physical copy may be viewed at the Public Safety office in the lower level of Ludwig Center.

A fire is defined as any instance of open flame or other burning in a place not intended to contain the burning or in an uncontrolled manner. If a fire occurs in an ONU building, community members should immediately call 911 and notify the Department of Public Safety (815-939-5265). When calling, please provide as much information as possible about the location, date, time and cause of the fire.

SMOKE-FREE ENVIRONMENT

Olivet Nazarene University prohibits smoking on campus properties, including, but not limited to, classrooms, offices, enclosed buildings and facilities, walkways, in University-owned vehicles, during indoor and outdoor athletic events and on campus grounds.

FIRE SAFETY EDUCATION: TRAINING

The University takes fire safety seriously and has established fire safety programs for students living in on-campus residence halls. Students watch a University-specific training video on the first two days of class during the fall semester which includes information on fire evacuation procedures. Employees are also required to watch this video via the Vector Solutions learning management system.

The Department of Public Safety has an MOU with the Bourbonnais Fire Protection District to jointly share a BullsEye Digital Fire Extinguisher Training System. Public Safety leads fire extinguisher training sessions for various members of the campus community including science lab teaching assistants and housing Resident Assistants.

FIRE/EVACUATION DRILLS

The University requires complete evacuation of buildings during a fire alarm, whether the alarm is part of a pre-planned drill, a false alarm, or a real fire. Individuals who ignore fire alarms or any other required evacuations may face disciplinary action.

Campus wide fire drills and tornado shelter/evacuation drills are held every other year at the start of the fall semester (fire) and in late winter/early spring (tornado). These drills involve all the academic buildings, administrative buildings, and inner-campus dorms, and at least one of these drills is held each academic year (July-June). Building safety teams may also conduct their own drills and exercises.

During the 2024 calendar year, the inner-campus dorms had the following number of unplanned evacuations due to smoke/fire alarms being activated: Chapman (3), Hills (9), McClain (5), Nesbitt (3), Parrott (12), Williams (7).

SMOKE DETECTORS & SPRINKLER SYSTEMS

In compliance with the Illinois Fire Sprinkler Law, all inner-campus residence halls have been equipped with smoke detectors, sprinkler systems and an integrated Fire Alarm Control Panel system.

FIRE REPORTING PROCEDURES

After the discovery of a fire, or the activation of a fire alarm, students, faculty and staff should call 911 and contact the Department of Public Safety. The Resident Director or Building Safety Team Leader should also be notified. If any damage is present, the Department of Public Safety will notify Physical Plant to assess and repair the damage.

FIRE SAFETY POLICIES

Candles & Torches

- Candles (including decorative, unburned wicks, etc.), torches, incense and any other open flame devices are strictly prohibited in campus residence halls, academic or other campus buildings.

Cooking

- Cooking is only permitted in designated kitchens and kitchenettes. Residents are strongly encouraged and reminded to never leave anything on the stove/in the microwave unattended. Cooking equipment, such as a hot plate, is strictly prohibited.

Extension Cords

- Also referred to as temporary wiring, extension cords for electrical power and lighting are allowed with prior permission of the Resident Director. Electrical wiring, devices, appliances and other equipment which are modified or damaged and constitute an electrical shock or fire hazard shall not be used. Extension cords shall not be used as a substitute for permanent wiring.

Halogen Lighting

- Halogen lamps are strictly prohibited in University housing because of associated fire hazard concerns with high-energy usage.

Portable Space Heaters

- Space heaters are not permitted in residence halls without prior permission from the Resident Director.

IN THE EVENT OF A FIRE

Fire alarms alert community members of potential hazard. Community members are required to heed their warning and evacuate buildings immediately upon hearing a fire alarm in a facility. The Fire Marshall can levy fines and penalties to individuals who fail to evacuate a building promptly.

Please follow these procedures in the event of a fire:

- Pull the fire alarm
- Consider using a fire extinguisher – but only if ALL of the following are true:
 - You have been trained to use one
 - The fire is small and contained
 - The room is not filled with smoke

- Leave the building immediately using the closest emergency exit (always be prepared with two possible exit routes from your current location)
- Don't take anything with you except your phone—but only if you can grab it quickly
- Never use an elevator during a fire
- Close doors behind you
- Call 911 when safe to do so, and then call ONU Public Safety (815-939-5265)
- Assemble in a designated area away from the building
- If unable to exit a building, go to the nearest stairwell or safe area of refuge and call 911 to report your location.
- Re-enter the building only when instructed by officials

RESIDENCE HALL INSPECTIONS

Resident Directors perform monthly health and safety inspections in individual rooms to find and eliminate safety violations. The inspections include, but are not limited to, a visual examination of electrical cords, sprinkler heads, smoke detectors, fire extinguishers and other life safety systems.

In addition, each room will be examined for the presence of prohibited items (e.g., sources of open flames, such as candles; halogen lamps; portable cooking appliances in non-kitchen areas; etc.) or prohibited activity (e.g., smoking in the room; tampering with life safety equipment; possession of pets or alcohol; etc.). This inspection will also include a general assessment of food and waste storage and cleanliness of the room.

PLANS FOR FUTURE IMPROVEMENTS IN FIRE SAFETY

The University continues to assess and upgrade fire safety equipment as an ongoing process to ensure that all equipment meets National Fire Safety standards. Since false alarms may lower the evacuation responses, the University will analyze the cause or causes of false alarms and work with the Bourbonnais Fire Protection District to reduce their occurrence.

One improvement currently being planned is to add exterior and interior numbers to the entryways of campus buildings. This will aid first responders in more quickly reaching the location of a fire or other emergency. Athletics facilities are being addressed first and this project should be completed during the 2025 fall semester. Future fire safety improvements will be made as needed as part of the ongoing assessment process.

 - Annual report and daily log requirements
 - Crime classification definitions
 - How to address a program review and use Department of Education resources
